With love look forward to Him coming



The paschal cycle contains preparation days before Easter, otherwise known as the Great Fast or Lent. In time the celebration of Christ's birthday became ever more solemn. Slowly there developed a preparation time for Christmas which, in imitation of the Great Fast, was finally fixed as lasting 40 days. In the West it is known as Advent or the time before Christ's coming to earth. Originally it was connected with His second coming since that is how the Gospel readings about it were read. It is only because these readings

occurred before Christmas that the pre-Christmas period became known as Advent, i.e., His first coming when He was born. It was not until the 12th century that our Church determined to observe this preparation time before Christmas with a 40 days fast. Since it begins on November 15th, the day after the Feast of St. Philip, it is popularly known as "filipovka." It is interesting that it was less strict than the Great Fast.


Liturgically, therefore, it remains that the Church begins to prepare us spiritually for the celebration of the coming of Christ on November 15th.

On Christmas we celebrate our Savior's coming and according to His promise His presence in the Church "until the consumation of time." We also look forward to His glorious second coming at the end of time. As the "people of God" we should eagerly look forward to Christ's second coming.

Our problem is to what extent are we ready to meet Christ at His second coming? Are we ready, are we anxious, to see Him, to meet Him? We are the people of hope and expectation who believe in God's future, God's lordship over the world. He is with us in the Church through the Holy Spirit and through His words in the Gospel. We believe in His final coming when He will vindicate the ways of God, deal and judge His creatures with justice and mercy. We are told that the Son of God is also called Emmanuel, i.e., God with us. To what extent are we aware of His mysterious presence in the Church, in the world? His spiritual and grace-presence is invisible and intangible but not to the eyes of faith! His first coming was fateful, foreboding and divisive although it was meant to be unitive, restorative, healing and saving. His Kingdom, even if it seems to be a "small flock" and ever under the attacks of various enemies, is still here; visibly and invisibly marching forward and winning battles. His day is coming, is approaching and will not fail to materialize. Therefore, preparing for Christmas is not only concerned with the worthy readiness to welcome Him on Christmas day. It is also a reminder that our whole life is an expectation, an unconquerable turning toward Him in firm hope and trust that He is faithful, that He is coming not to salvage the remnants, but to take His lordly sway over the world which the Father gave to Him. May we be among those who will be eagerly waiting for Him, who joyfully and "with love looked forward to His coming."

"During this fast, it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation for wine and oil) on Tuesday and Thursday. The fast is observed more strictly from December 10 (in some traditions) or from December 20 (in other traditions), with daily strict abstinence, and a mitigated abstinence on (wine and oil) on Saturday and Sunday (cf. the Great Fast and the Dormition Fast). The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880, 2). This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety." –Fr. David Petras

Annual Stewardship Appeal

He served as the Associate Priest at St. Peter and Paul Byzantine Catholic Church in Kosice, Slovakia before coming to the United States. When Bishop Milan approached Father Lukas

about joining the Eparchy of Parma, he did not hesitate to respond to the call. Father Lukas is assigned to the Holy Resurrection Church, in Euclid, Ohio. Celebrating Thanksgiving as Byzantine Catholics

For those of us who follow the New Calendar, the giant feast associated with Thanksgiving always occurs during a 4o-day period of fasting prior to Christmas. Fasting is generally dispensed with on Thanksgiving, however, so that we may participate in this traditional American holiday as a harvest festival, a time for families to come together and celebrate, and to offer thanks to God for all He grants to us individually, as a family, and as a country. The Philip's Fast is usually a fairly lenient fasting time in any case, especially before December 10th, so such *economia* should not be looked upon as a major violation of any canon. Also, as Christians, the Apostle Paul advises us to not give offense either by our fasting or our feasting, and certainly it would be odd for Byzantine Catholic citizens in America to not join the rest of the country in commonly celebrating a Thanksgiving feast to the glory of God, whether it be with the traditional meats or not. "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever

you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). Ideally, Byzantine Catholics participate in the Divine Liturgy on Thanksgiving morning prior to feasting, since the Divine Eucharist is the ultimate offering of thanksgiving to God. To that end, we will celebrate the Divine Liturgy Thankgiving morning at 10am.


Monthly Chant Practice
