"We are Catholics with the common heritage of our Orthodox brothers but in unity with the Holy Father in Rome." – Bishop Milan



# Philip's Fast *(Filipovka)*

#### Nov. 15<sup>th</sup> – Dec. 24<sup>th</sup>

"During this fast, it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation for wine and oil) on Tuesday and Thursday. The fast is observed more strictly from December 10 (in some traditions) or from December 20 (in other traditions), with daily strict abstinence, and a mitigated abstinence on (wine and oil) on Saturday and Sunday (cf. the Great Fast and the Dormition Fast). The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880, 2). This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety." –Fr. David Petras

# Our Lady of Guadalupe

The icon of our Lady of Guadalupe (feast day: December 12th ) appears as a type of the "woman clothed with the sun," described in the book of Revelation (12:1). Though it is Roman Catholic, it is very much in the tradition one also finds in Orthodoxy of miraculously-Eastern appearing images. She is surrounded by a radiant mandorla found in many European images, though in the Guadalupe image, Mary stands on the crescent moon, hands together and head inclined, without the child Jesus.

The Guadalupe appeared image miraculously on the *tilma* (mantle) of an Aztec convert named Juan Diego, to whom the Virgin Mary is held to have appeared on Tepeyac Hill (a site sacred to the Aztec earth goddess Tonantzin). The legend relates that at one point she told him to go to a certain place where he found Castilian roses blooming in winter. He filled his *tilma* with the miraculous roses, and when he opened it to show a bishop as proof of his Marian apparition, the tilma was found to have the image of the Virgin imprinted on it – not painted, but "not made by hands" as the Russians and Greeks also say of certain of their miraculous images.



# Decorating for Christmas!

Because our parish customarily decorates well before Christmas, during the penitential season of the Philip's Fast, this year we'll decorate in two phases – in a more subdued way at first, during the Fast, and then we'll enliven it a great deal on Christmas Eve.

Firstly, we've ordered both red and white poinsettias. We will put out only the red (which is a penitential color in our Church) during the Fast. And then, on Christmas Eve, we will double the number of poinsettias, leaving out the red but adding just as many white ones (a color of celebration and joy in our Church).

Then, I'd like to use real trees instead of the illuminated animatronic angels (real, because everything in the church should be real rather than fake, whenever possible). We'll put thes up with minimal or no decoration at first. Then, on Christmas Eve, we can fill them with



lights and decorations, which can remain on them throughout the Christmas season.

I'd like everyone to donate an ornament. That way, the trees become a representation of our community rejoicing together in celebration of the birth of our Lord. Because they will be in the church, I'd like these ornaments to be of a sacred character.




