If you are prudently unable to go to confession at this time, confess and express your sorrow for your sins to the Lord and prayerfully resolve to go to confession as soon as it becomes prudent. We are forgiven the moment we repent, which includes the intention to confess.

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Public Liturgical Services

Liturgical services are now being celebrated publically. There is still no obligation to attend.

Whenever you do not pray the Divine Liturgy, it is traditional to pray the Typika instead. There are also many other services we may pray at home as well, including Vespers, Matins, and the Hours. Guidelines for Reopening

- We are to clean & sanitize the church before each public service – especially areas that are commonly touched (railings, doors, backs of pews, light switches, etc.) Please consider volunteering to assist with this and/or donating cleaning supplies

- The Holy Water containers are removed. Containers of holy water are available by request

- All the pew books are removed.

- The doors from the narthex into the nave will be kept open at all times.

- Every other pew is blocked off with ribbon and there are marks in the pews 6 feet apart. In the aisle is a single file row of marks 6 feet apart for your approach to receive Holy Communion.

- You may sit close to the members of your own household, but keep 6 feet away from others.

- You are encouraged to wear a mask.

- You may venerate the icons, etc. by bowing rather than by kissing.

- All other types of gatherings, such as our coffee social, ECF, and adult classes remain cancelled.

- If you are ill/fevered, please stay home. There is never an obligation to come to church when ill.

- If you approach for holy communion, tilt your head back, open your mouth wide, do not say anything, and do not close your mouth upon the spoon. The priest will wear a mask and use a separate spoon for each communicant. The spoons will be sanitized with pure alcohol.

- The ushers will not take up the collection, but there is a basket near the entrance where you can leave your offering. Please continue to support St. Stephen financially at this time.

- Celebration of baptisms, weddings, and funerals are allowed, following these precautions.

- To help with keeping physical distance between people, please consider alternately attending Vespers or Matins or Divine Liturgy, rather than only the Divine Liturgy. Even in ordinary times, any of these three services fulfills your Sunday "obligation."

- If you do not feel safe, remember that there is no obligation to attend church at this time. Rather, keep the day holy with prayer at home.

- Live streams of our liturgical services will continue.
