



The first Sunday of the Great Fast is called the Feast of the Triumph of Orthodoxy. It is a historical feast commemorating the return of the icons to the churches in the year 843 after the heresy of iconoclasm was overcome. The spiritual theme of the day is first of all the victory of the True Faith. "This is the victory that overcomes the world, our faith" (1 Jn 5.4). Secondly, the icons of the saints bear witness that man, "created in the image and likeness of God" (Gen 1.26), becomes holy and godlike through the purification of himself as God's living image. **Bring your favorite icon to church for a procession at 9:45am**

Vegetarian Vegetable (Barley, Bean or Rice) Soup

(Good for strict fast days)

- 1 cup of chopped celery
- 1 cup of diced carrots
- 1 cup of shredded cabbage
- 1 small can (6 oz.) tomato juice
- 1 cup of diced potatoes with peels on
- 1 diced parsnip
- 1 small can (8oz.) stewed tomatoes
- About ¼ cup of chopped parsley
- 1 small chopped onion
- 1 bay leaf
- About 2 quarts of cold water
- 2 tablespoons of salt (more or less to taste)

Add all ingredients to a large pot with a lid. Bring to a slow boil and cook until vegetables are tender: (about 2 hours by stove or 4 - 6 hours in a crock pot). May be served as is or over barley, beans or rice already prepared according to package directions.
