‡ *“Taking the shroud upon his shoulders, and preceded by the Processional Cross, candles, and incense, [the priest] goes around the Holy Table and... the church is circled three times with the singing of the Troparion. (option: one procession around the church may be made) and the burial shroud is placed in the Tomb. The procession is made outside the Church if possible.” -Typikon*

§ *“At the singing of ‘Holy God...’, a procession is made with the Burial Shroud [as at Burial Vespers]. ‘Holy God...’ is sung as often as necessary, according to the funeral melody. To process outside the church is preferable.” -Typikon*

* At the Paschal Vigil, we change from dark to bright vestments and proclaim the Gospel of the Resurrection.

† At the Midnight Office of Pascha, the Burial Shroud is brought from the Tomb to the Holy Table, where it remains until the Ascension.

‡ *“At the beginning of Matins, the Resurrection Procession [a.k.a. the Rush Procession] is held. The priest open all the doors of the icon screen. They remain open throughout Bright Week. The priest then lights the candles of the faithful. They are to be held for the Resurrection Matins. The procession goes around the church during the singing of the sticheron. The service of Matins begins before the closed exterior doors of the church. At the final singing of “Christ is risen...” in the opening Troparia, the priest makes the sign of the cross on the doors with the hand cross. The doors are opened and all enter the church and the service continues” -Typikon*

§ *“By tradition in ths Slav recensions, the Gospel at this Liturgy [‘In the beginning was the Word...’] is read in various languages.” -Typikon*

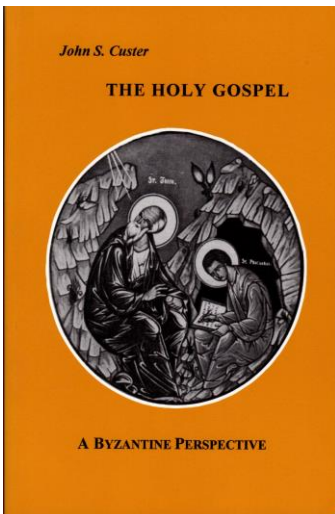
Byzantine Book Club

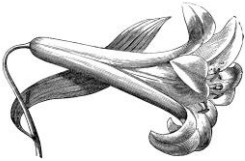
