^{*&}quot;Days of Alleluia" are days on which we sing "Alleluia" instead of "the Lord is God" at Matins. When these days fall on Mon - Fri, they are penitential days. We wear dark vestments, make prostrations, and pray the prayer of St. Ephrem at the liturgical services. We do not pray the anaphora (the eucharist prayer). Make an effort to attend services on these days during the fasts because, as Fr. Michael Bezruchka says, "We are encouraged to pray more, not less, on these days"



The Apostles Fast begins with Vespers on the evening of All Saints Sunday (May 30th). This is a penitential season in our Church that ends with the feast of Ss. Peter & Paul (June 29th). Get it started off right with our service Vespers including prostrations and the Prayer of St. Ephrem.


"The Typikon prescribes strict abstinence [no meat, dairy, eggs, fish, wine, or oil] on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, with a mitigated abstinence [permitting wine and oil] on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880, § 2). This fast may be observed voluntarily." – Fr. David M. Petras, S.E.O.D. 2021 *Typikon*, page 50.

Byzantine Book Glub

Our Book Club will next meet on **May 31st at 7pm** and continue discussing *The Holy Gospel: A Byzantine Perspective*, by Fr. Jack Custer, (rector of the Byzantine Catholic Cathedral in Passaic). The book looks at the Gospels from the perspective of the Greek Fathers and the liturgical usage of the Byzantine Churches with reference to contemporary scholarship.

The Akathist Hymn to the Theotokos & Ever-Virgin Mary

During the Apostles Fast (at least for starters), we will sing the Akathist **every Tuesday evening at 7pm**. In the Byzantine tradition, Wednesdays are dedicated to the Theotokos and, liturgically, days begin with sunset, so Tuesday evening seems like a good time to offer our prayers to her as a parish.

"One of the greatest marvels of Greek religious poetry, with a richness of imagery that is the despair of any translator, the Akathistos Hymn has twenty-four main stanzas, alternatively long and short: each long stanza bears the title 'ikos,' ending with the refrain "Rejoice, O Bride and maiden ever pure!", while each short stanza is termed 'kontakion' and ends with the refrain "Alleluia!" The title 'Akathistos' means literally 'not sitting,' the Hymn being so-called because all remain standing while it is sung. The greater part of the Hymn is made up of praises addressed to the Holy Virgin, each beginning with the salutation of the Archangel Gabriel--'hail' or 'rejoice.' (Luke 1:28) The Hymn passes in review the main events connected with Christ's Incarnation, starting with the Annunciation (first ikos) and ending with the Flight into Egypt (sixth ikos) and the Presentation in the Temple (seventh kontakion)."

from the Catechism CHRIST – OUR PASCHA

I. REVELATION OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

A. God's Revelation

- 19 God's Revelation is realized simultaneously by deeds and words, which are intrinsically bound up with each other and shed light upon each other.¹³ It involves a specific "divine pedagogy:"¹⁴ God communicates himself to humanity gradually, preparing it in stages for the reception of the Revelation of his own self, culminating in the fullness of this Revelation in the person and activity of the incarnate Word, Jesus Christ. "Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds" (*Heb* 1:1-2). Only in his incarnate Word, which was from the beginning (see *Jn* 1:1), that is, in Jesus Christ, does God reveal himself in all fullness; for in him, together with human nature, "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (*Col* 2:9).
- 20 In the Old Testament, God manifested himself to Moses on Mount Sinai as *The-One-Who-Is, "I am who am"* (*Ex* 3:14), revealing to Moses not something about himself, but his very Self. The name *The-One-Who-Is* points to the personal nature of God, who possesses being in his very Self and who is the Source of all existence and life. In the New Testament, God, who is first to go out to meet humankind (see *Jn* 3:16; 1 *Jn* 4:19), reveals himself as Father through his incarnate Son, Jesus Christ, and in the Holy Spirit (see *Mt* 11:27).
