
GREAT VESPERS PROPERS FOR MAY 10TH, 2021

¹Monday in the Sixth Week of Pascha

The holy apostle Simon the Zealot, one of the Twelve; also called the "Canaanean." Tradition tells us that it was Simon who was the bridegroom of the wedding which Jesus attended in Cana of Galilee. He preached the Gospel in Mauretania in Africa, and was finally crucified like his Lord.

The First Kathisma ("Blessed is the man..") is sung.



Continue with Psalm 140: "O Lord, set a guard before my mouth..." (p.11, 2 of 4).





Lord. * For they themselves preferred the darkness of the letter of the Law * to the light of Christ, our radiant Sun. * By this healing He renewed the Sabbath Feast * and enlightened the darkness of the Law, * lifting the veil to shed light upon those who had been blind, * and who now announce to the world that they see the Lord ** who is the Source of our light.





The aposticha are from the Menaion: (Tone 1)

Aposticheron:

O ever all-memorable Simon, * you drank of the torrent of sweetness, * drinking with divine wisdom * the understanding of God * which you fervently desired. * To Him have you now joyously passed over, ** deified by the all-splendid glory of the Trinity and immeasurable peace.

Cantor: Their sound has gone forth into all the earth, and their words to the ends of the world.

Aposticheron:

O all-wondrous Simon, * contemplating the beauty of God, * and looking upon it as far as you are able, * delighting therein through a higher union, * and deified by His gifts, * rejoicing, you reached the only Divine One * Whom you desire, O ever all-memorable preacher of Christ, ** who dwells now with the angels.

Cantor: The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament proclaims His handiwork.

Aposticheron:

O most blessed Simon, * you have shown yourself to be a faithful mediator between God and men; * and now, by your right bold supplications, * render Christ merciful to us, * and never cease to entreat the Lord, ** that He grant to our souls peace and great mercy.


