
Philip's Fast (Filipovka)

Nov. 15th - Dec. 24th

"According to the forty-day tradition, the Philip's Fast in preparation for Christmas begins on Monday, November 15th. During this fast, it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation for wine and oil) on Tuesday and Thursday. The fast is observed more strictly from December 10 (in some traditions) or from December 20 (in other traditions), with daily strict abstinence, and a mitigated abstinence (wine and oil) on Saturday and Sunday (cf. the Great Fast and the Dormition Fast). The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880, 2). This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety." –Fr. David Petras

What is a Day of Alleluia?

All weekdays during the Great Fast and certain weekdays during the minor fasts, such as the Philip's Fast we are now observing, are sometimes called "Days of Alleluia" because on these days we sing "Alleluia" instead of "the Lord is God" at Matins. When these days fall on Monday through Friday, they are penitential days. The vestments worn are dark. We make prostrations and pray the prayer of St. Ephrem at the liturgical services for these days. Perhaps most strikingly, we do not pray the anaphora (the eucharist prayer) on these days. It is good to make an effort to attend services on these days during the fasts because, as Fr. Michael Bezruchka says, "We are encouraged to pray more, not less, on these days"


Online Benefit Event for the Nuns of Christ the Bridegroom Monastery

CHRIST - OUR PASCHA

Part One THE FAITH OF THE CHURCH

II. WE BELIEVE IN THE TRINITY, ONE IN ESSENCE AND UNDIVIDED

A. We Believe in God the Father

1. God the Father Revealed in the Holy Scriptures

- God reveals himself as Person: "I am who I am," or "the One-Who-Is" (*Ex* 3:14). This God-who-is-Person is the only one who really *is*. Everything else exists only inasmuch as God wills it to exist. God is holy, that is, totally different from all creation. There is no other like God. He is unique. Thus, it is not possible to imagine him with our thoughts, or to portray him in any material way: "You shall not make for yourself an idol" (*Ex* 20:4). In contrast to lifeless idols, the true God *lives*. Lacking appropriate words to express the mystery of God's life, Holy Scripture often makes use of anthropomorphisms, thereby applying to God the behavioural traits of a living human being: God *loves, converses, assists, pities, is sad, becomes angry, does battle, punishes...*
- In the Old Testament, God reveals himself through various images and events that witness to his presence: in the three travellers whom Abraham received; in the vision of the ladder joining heaven and earth in the dream of the patriarch Jacob; before Moses in the burning bush that was not consumed; in the pillars of fire and cloud (see *Ex* 13:21); over the Ark of the Covenant (see *Ex* 25:22); and as a quiet and gentle breeze (see 1 *Kgs* 19:12).
- The Chosen People of God profess their God, exalting him with various names: Saviour (2 *Sm* 22:2-3; *Ps* 106[107]:21; *Is* 43:3-4; *Is* 45:15); Creator (*Job* 4:17; *Job* 32:22; *Ps* 95[96]:6; *Is* 17:7; *Is* 51:13); Lord (*Ex* 3:15); Father (*Ps* 89[90]:27; *Is* 9:5; *Is* 63:16; *Mal* 1:6); Bridegroom (*Hos* 2:22); and Shepherd (*Ps* 23[24]:1). However, the Old Testament titles were merely prefigurements of the Revelation of God as the Father of the onlybegotten Son. "No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known" (*Jn* 1:18).
- The Son of God, Jesus Christ, in whom along with a human nature "the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (*Col* 2:9), reveals the Father: "All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him" (*Mt* 11:27). Jesus teaches us to address God as "Our Father" (*Mt* 6:9) and to imitate his perfection: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (*Mt* 5:48). In Jesus Christ, the invisible God becomes visible for people: "The Father and I are one" (*Jn* 10:30) and "whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (*Jn* 14:9).
