

The Fast of Cheesefare Week

"Today this fast is considerd a part of the Great Fast, [or rather] a preparation period in which we ener gradually into the asceticism of the Fast. It originated, however, in the Oriental Orthodox (non-Chalcedonian) Churches and was separate from the Great Fast. It was called the Fast of Nineveh, and was observed three weeks before the Great Fast, in what is now the Week after the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee. The Byzantine Church would not observe it at the same time as those Churches in which it was not in communion and moved it to the Week before the Great Fast." (Annual Typikon, p. 13)

The Holy & Great Fast


"All days of the Great Fast are Days of Alleluia, unless otherwise noted. On each day, the schedule of services begins with Matins in the morning to Vespers on the evening of the day itself. However, the commemoration of the saint is anticipated as usual.... Vespers and Matins during the Great Fast, beginning on Sunday evening, and concluding on Friday evening, end with the Troparia and prostrations, as given in the service books....

"The Great Fast is our penitential preparation for the great feast of Pascha (Passover). As such, it is one of the most ancient parts of the liturgical year. Its forty days symbolizes the forty years the Israelites wandered in the desert, while the Divine Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is the fulfillment of the promise of the manna, as St. John wrote, 'So Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave breatd from heaven; my Father give you the true bread from heaven" (John 6:32). In the Great Fast, we imitate Jesus our Lord, who fasted for forty days in the desert following his baptism. The Feast of Pascha was also the time for baptisms, and so the Great Fast was a time of preparion for baptism. Our observance of the Great Fast, therefore, is our renewal of our baptismal fervor....

"In the Great Fast, abstinence from meat, fish, dairy products, alcohol, and foods cooked in oil was prescribed fro all days, except days of mitigation. All Saturdays and Sundays, February 24, March 9, Wednesday to Friday of the Fifth Week, the Prefestive Day and Leave-taking (Otdanije) of Annunication were mitigations for wine and oil. The Feast of the Annunciation (March 25) and Palm Sunday were general mitigations [fish days]. The Ruthenian Metropolia prescribes strict abstinence (from meat and dairy products) on the First Monday of the Great Fast and Good Friday, and abstinence from meat on all Wednesdays and Fridays" (*Annual Typikon*, p. 15).

Praying the Psalms with Jesus – Adult ECF







One of our most successful ministries is the Welcoming Ministry that occurs just inside the main entrance of the Church. This includes the podium and welcome sign-in book, the table with new table clothes, the carpet under the table, the changeable wreaths, the "Welcome Home" sign, the book sales, the gifts of chotkis and word of welcome from Father John, and the greeters who welcome people to the Church. This is the first greeting people receive when the attend our worship.

Visitors need a sense of welcome and most return because they are welcomed. They need material about our Church. They need direction on inserts for worship and well as instruction on how to use our worship book. They need an invitation and directions to the Crystal room for the "agape" (love) meal following liturgy. All of these are offered by those serving as greeters offering a welcome to new people.

When a visitor signs the guest book with their email addresses, Fr. John adds this information to our mailing list. Imagine coming to a new church with no greeting and no information to help them find their way through a new experience. When visiting a new church experience without such a welcome many if not most of us would never return. THE FAITH OF THE CHURCH

III. WE BELIEVE IN GOD THE FATHER, CREATOR OF HEAVEN AND EARTH, AND IN OUR SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST, AND IN THE HOLY SPIRIT, THE LORD, THE GIVER OF LIFE

A. The Creator and His Creation

1. The Father Creates through the Son in the Holy Spirit b. The Goodness of Creation

In the account of the creation of the world, Holy Scripture discloses the way in which God assesses the world created by him: "And God saw that it was good" (*Gn* 1:10 et al.). Like an artist, God creates a masterpiece; he examines his creation with attention, and he delights in it. The Father contemplates the world and recognizes within its features the face of the Son—the first-born of all creation, by whom and for whom all was created (see *Col* 1:15f). The face of Christ comes through ever more distinctly throughout history—all the way to the incarnation of the Son of God and his second coming in glory. Creation is the visible icon of the invisible God. As history unfolds, this creation is being transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit into a "new creation," prefigured in the glorified body of the Risen Christ.

Contemplation—a deeper way of looking at the world, to which God calls us—teaches us to see the surrounding world not only as a material thing, or as something useful and pleasurable for our egos, but as the sphere of action of the personal God, who is distinct from us and from the world. The words of prayer from the Rite of the Great Blessing of Water provide us with a wonderful example of the Christian view of the world:

The sun sings your praises; the moon glorifies you; the stars entreat you; the light obeys you; the depths tremble before you; the springs serve you. You have stretched out the heavens like a tent; you have established the earth upon the waters; you have enclosed the sea with sand. You have poured forth air that living things may breathe...84

Contemplation of the world, in light of an experience of the personal God who alone is good (see *Lk* 18:19), provides the foundation for affirming the goodness of the world, of matter, and of all creation. "The world is good, and all its contents are seen to be wisely and skilfully ordered." In Holy Scripture, the image of God's plan for the world is Paradise (see *Gn* 2). The realization of this plan depends upon the cooperation of humankind with God. Paradise is God's gift, and at the same time, it is humankind's vocation.

110 Conceived by God as Paradise, the world is God's gift to humankind and the sphere of our relationship with God, with others, and with nature. For this reason, human beings cannot take a consumerist attitude towards the world, a world that is filled with the love and attention of the Giver. The Christian attitude towards the world is to see it as a gift of God. Growing in faith, Christians ascend in their understanding from the gifts to the Person of the Giver. Regarding the world as God's gift allows one to avoid two extremes: the reduction of its value (since the world is God's creation), or turning it into an absolute (since the world is not God).
