

^{*} We will celebrate *The Office of Holy Oil for Anointing of the Sick* before Presanctified Divine Liturgy begins. Holy Anointing is for all the ill and infirm and none who are baptized and who freely request it will be denied. "The general Anointing of the Sick may be done for all baptized Christians present at the Liturgy." (*Annual Typicon*). This is one of the holy mysteries, a sacrament, and should not be confused with mirovanije. Note that the Anointing is not a replacement for Confession. Confession will be offered before the Office of Holy Oil begins. Sincere contrition and a recent confession are necessary preparation for receiving the Holy Anointing of the Sick.



After Divine Liturgy today **Sunday**, **April 10**th, we are going to begin exploring a few of the psalms that Jesus prayed, in order to understand and pray the psalms ourselves and to enter into Jesus' prayer. We will use a study guide that provides brief background and explanation about the psalms and how Jesus used them, along with questions that will help us explore the biblical texts and reflect on what these prayers mean for us. The format of our sessions will be mainly a moderated discussion led by Kevin Perrotta, who is also the author of the study guide. The study guide is *Psalms II: Praying with Jesus*. Thomas Sunday Easter Egg Hunt!



CHRIST – OUR PASCHA Part One

THE FAITH OF THE CHURCH

III. WE BELIEVE IN GOD THE FATHER, CREATOR OF HEAVEN AND EARTH, AND IN OUR SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST, AND IN THE HOLY SPIRIT, THE LORD, THE GIVER OF LIFE

A. The Creator and His Creation

- 3. Humankind—the Crown of Creation
 - a. Humankind—in the Image and Likeness of God
 - 2) The Created Nature of Humankind
- As the Book of Genesis tell us, God created the human being out of the "dust of the earth"—matter—breathing into us the "breath of life," by virtue of which the human being becomes a "living being" (*Gn* 2:7). Holy Scripture portrays the Creator with the image of a potter, who *moulds* humankind according to his Image from the clay. This Image (see *Gn* 1:27) is the incarnate Son of God: "He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation" (*Col* 1:15). Humankind is created in the image of the Son:

Now God ... modelled [the human being] after his own Son; for by the hands of the Father, that is, by the Son and the Holy Spirit, the whole human being, and not [merely] a part of it, was made in the likeness of God. ... for the perfect human being consists in the commingling and the union of the *soul* receiving the *Spirit of the Father*, and the admixture of that *fleshly nature* that was moulded after the image of God. 110

- The image of God defines the dignity of the human being—already in the bodily state—as being *good*. The goodness of the body especially consists in the fact that in our relationships, through the body, we are able to express ourselves as persons. We receive this ability as a gift from God. The human body is able to receive into itself the Spirit of God; and so, the apostle Paul refers to the human body as the "temple of the Holy Spirit" (1 *Cor* 6:19). Here lies the *mystery* of the body and the fullness of its destiny. This is why Christianity regards the human body as a temple, consecrated for the service of God and neighbour.
- Having created us in his own image, God calls us to holiness: "May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless" (1 *Thes* 5:23). Saint Gregory of Nyssa thus states that Saint Paul uses "the word 'body' for the nutritive part; denoting the sensitive [part] by the word 'soul,' and the intellectual by the word 'spirit.' "111
- For the sanctification of humankind, God gave one commandment. We read: "of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat" (*Gn* 2:17). The fulfilment of this one commandment in Paradise would have permitted humankind to eat of the "tree of life;" it would have allowed them "to receive immortality as reward from [God];"112 and it would have transfigured them "into one Spirit with the Lord,"113 into "a spiritual being, who has surrendered the body to the authority of the Spirit."114
