



Come, Follow Me

The Dormition Fast

PROCLAIM A HOLY FAST! (Joel 1:14) "The traditional rule for the Dormition Fast is a strict abstinence [abstinence from meat, fish, dairy products, eggs, alcohol, and foods cooked in oil] **from August 1 to 14**, with the usual mitigations (permitting wine and oil) for Saturday and Sunday and the Feast of the Transfiguration (August 6). It is, therefore, observed as the Great Fast. The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880). The observance of this fast is voluntary" - from the Typicon arranged by Archpriest David M. Petras, S.E.O.D. for use in the Byzantine Ruthenian Metropolia of Pittsburgh.

Traditional fasting during the two-week Dormition fast is like that during most of Great Fast:

Monday-Friday: Strict Fast (no meat, dairy, eggs, fish, wine, or oil)

Saturday and Sunday: Wine and Oil permitted Holy Transfiguration: Fish, Wine, & Oil permitted.

From Bulgakov: (Translated by Archpriest Eugene Tarris)

Beginning August 1 and continuing until August 15, the Church has always observed the Dormition Fast as established of old, keeping it according to an unwritten tradition. The most ancient mention of it is by the name of Autumn Fast, placed in the 7th month by Leo the Great. However, in the ancient Church there were disagreements concerning the duration of this fast. The reason for this was the feast of Transfiguration, because some decided to eat meat on this day and others continued the decision to fast for 4 days, others for 8 days. Finally, the old tradition concerning this fast in view of the doubts about the quantity of its days was sealed in a conciliar definition in 1166 during the reign of the Constantinopolitan Patriarch Luke Chrysoberges. Since that time the single paradigmatic order of this fast was established in the Eastern Churches. With the establishment of the Dormition fast, the Church, on the one hand, guides us to spiritual transfiguration, observing the fast as a means to graceful internal circumspection, and on the other hand, motivates us to imitate the Mother of God, Who spent all her life in the asceticism of fasting and prayer. In the severity of fasting this fast approaches the Forty Day Fast. It is weakened on Saturdays, Sundays, and likewise on the feast of Transfiguration. In all this fast, except for the day of Transfiguration, the Ustav [Typikon] does not permit eating fish; on Saturdays and Sundays cooking with olive oil and wine is allowed; on Tuesday and Thursday, cooking is without olive oil; on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays xerophagia (Ustav [Typikon] Chapter 33) is specified. On some days of the Dormition fast, as well as in the Petrine Fast (see May 17), in Matins the Alleluia or Troparion is prescribed, "We do prostrations even up to the time of Communion" (see the Ustav [Typikon] Chapter 33).

Paraklesis

During the upcoming Dormition Fast, it is traditional to celebrate the beautiful Office of Supplication to the Theotokos known as the Paraklesis (or Paraklis). Keep an eye on the bulletin for several opportunities to pray this deeply moving service to our Mother. The first time will be today, **Sunday**, **July 31**st, **at 7pm.** Don't let the Dormition Fast go by without coming to the Paraklesis!

On the Great Feast of the Transfiguration, the Church blesses the first fruits, especially grapes and apples. We will offer this blessing after the Ambon Prayer at the Divine Liturgy for the Feast at **10am on Saturday**, **August 6**th. Bring your fruits to Liturgy that morning and place them on the table for the blessing.

The Office of Holy Repentance

During this penitential season in preparation for the Dormition of the Theotokos & Ever Virgin Mary, we will celebrate the full form of the office of holy repentance on **Tuesday, August 9th at 7pm**. This includes private confession to a priest. Fr. Constantin & Fr. John will both be available for confessions on this evening. This is a good opportunity for those who have been a long time away from this holy mystery to return, and for all of us to to go to confession and rejoice in the mercy of our forgiving Lord Jesus Christ.


