



From the Protomartyr Stephen Evangelization Society:

Was the Street Fair "evangelical"?

I'm of the belief that all things we do as a Church and as individual members need to have an evangelical purpose. In fact, studies show that lay members are the principal evangelists. Ninety percent of all new Christians say that they came to Christ and His Church because of the kindness and honesty of a friend or relative. In other words, the main reason the Church grows and people come to Christ is because of your witness to them. Could that be the key to our future growth as a parish?

We've tried a few things these past three years to evangelize. All have born some fruit. Some were more visible than others. Look at the work many have done to attract young adults. We made a film which will soon be released that feature this very thing. Watch for the entries online. Eighteen-year-old Lance has been instrumental in this effort. Look at the many young adult events that have taken place and the new altar servers we have.

But what of the Allen Park Street Fair?

A total of 15 volunteers from St. Stephen's answered questions and gave witness to hundreds of people on two of the hottest days of the year.

We have seen some profound benefits to the Kingdom of God already. Some benefits will be seen over time. We may not ever see some others, but God knows.

Here are some of the benefits we already see and may well see over time:

First, it gave and gives Christ and His Church exposure to the city and the surrounding areas.

Second, the participation of a significant number of our members in the event inspires others to share the message of Christ and His Church with their own friends and neighbors and may well inspire a larger number of participants in next year's street fair and perhaps other events.

Third, the discussions themselves help those who participated become more aware of the needs and desires of others for the Gospel.

Fourth, participation in such events helps the participants to be integrated further into the Body of Christ.

Fifth, our goal is always to help others find their way to joining the saints and angels in heaven to praise and worship our Maker and Sovereign, the Holy Trinity. That is always preeminent in our thinking and it is why we evangelize.

This event wasn't our first effort and certainly won't be our last. Think of the church picnic, the All Hallows Eve Trunk or Treat, the VBS effort of 2021, the welcoming work on Sunday mornings, etc.

The effort put toward these and all our events is inspiring.

Finally, a special thanks must be given to Victor Jiompkowski who organized and ran this program. Thanks also to Lance Remisoski and all who participated. Thanks also to Father John and Father Deacon Lawrence who encouraged and encourages these efforts. Give them a thank you when you see them.

A. The Creator and His Creation

3. Humankind—the Crown of Creation

a. Humankind—in the Image and Likeness of God

4) The Freedom and Responsibility of Humankind

- The Creator, having fashioned humanity freely out of love, calls us to love—the highest creative expression of a person. For this God grants us freedom. Human love flows from God as from a wellspring, for "God is love" (1 *Jn* 4:8). Freedom belongs to God's image in humankind; therefore, his grace does not abolish our freedom.¹¹⁷
- The most profound dimension of human freedom consists in being able to freely choose God and to be with him. This is the good. Yet with this same freedom, we can also reject our relationship with God—and this is evil. To be free is to possess the capacity for unfettered self-determination. 118 Evil, in fact, does not belong to creation; it only appears when humanity renounces the choice for good, and thus abuses its freedom. As God's gift, freedom is strengthened through every free choice of the good. On the other hand, it is limited when humanity becomes dependent upon evil 119 which is a consequence of its renouncing the good.
- A human being is responsible for his or her free choice: "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die" (*Gn* 2:16-17). This commandment of God does not limit human freedom nor does it interfere in our choice. God gives the commandment as a gift to strengthen us in all that is good. By breaking the commandment, a human being rejects God and by this very means introduces sin into the world, and through sin death (see *Rom* 5:12). By eating of the fruit of the "tree of knowledge of good and evil," one forfeits access to the "tree of life" and loses ties to God: "Communion with God is life and light ... But separation from God is death." 120
- When Adam and Eve transgressed the commandment, they severed their bond with God. Their choice became the cause of death, and the "tree of knowledge of good and evil" became its instrument. The cross was also such an instrument of death, prepared on Golgotha for the Son of God, Jesus Christ. However, by accepting death on the cross, he transformed the instrument of death, the cross, into a "tree of life:" "Truly, O Christ, the tree of life has blossomed. For the cross, planted in the earth, fed with blood and water from your pure side, has put forth life for us." 121 It has become a *life-giving cross*.
- The Church witnesses liturgically to this in the Feast of the Exaltation of the Precious and Life-Giving Cross (September 14/27), when we contemplate the Life-Giving Cross in the light of Holy Pascha: "To your Cross, O Master, we bow in veneration; and we glorify your holy Resurrection." The Lord voluntarily took upon himself the sin of the world and transfigured the cross of death into a sign of the Resurrection, having trampled death by death, and granted us eternal life.
