




PUMPKIN PIES!

Philip's Fast (Filipovka)


Nov. 15th - Dec. 24th

"According to the forty-day tradition, the Philip's Fast in preparation for Christmas begins on Monday, November 15th. During this fast, it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation for wine and oil) on Tuesday and Thursday. The fast is observed more strictly from December 10 (in some traditions) or from December 20 (in other traditions), with daily strict abstinence, and a mitigated abstinence (wine and oil) on Saturday and Sunday (cf. the Great Fast and the Dormition Fast). The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season (Canon 880, 2). This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety." –Fr. David Petras

Upcoming Adult Eastern Christian Formation Opportunities

In response to the expressed interests of our parishioners, we will be offering the following opportunities for continued growth in our faith in Jesus Christ:

Reflections on the Divine Liturgy

Starting on **Sunday**, **November 20**th, we will gather most Sundays in the coming few months after the Divine Liturgy to reflect upon the Divine Liturgy together. Fr. John will present information about the Divine Liturgy and there will also be the opportunity for each of us to share our own thoughts and experiences of Divine Liturgy.

The Holy Land & Biblical Archaeology

As we enter into the Sundays of preparation for the Great Fast, Daniel Lauffer will offer us a presentation on his experiences in the Holy Land and of Biblical Archaeology. These reflections will help strengthen our awareness of the real humanity of our Lord Jesus Christ, who really lived and died and rose again in a real time and place of history. This is especially appropriate to reflect on as we prepare for the Great and Holy Week which will lead into our celebration of Pascha.

Bible Study

As we enter the Great Fast itself, Kevin Perrotta will again lead us in study and discussion of Holy Scripture. Please continue to share with us what particular books or themes you'd most appreciate.

Daily Prayer in the Byzantine Tradition

Also as we are increasing our life of prayer during the Great Fast, Fr. John will teach and lead discussion on the Byzantine tradition of daily prayer, both in terms of daily liturgical prayer and also in terms of developing our own rules of prayer for private prayer in our homes. This course will be offered on a weeknight during the Great Fast.

Day House

The Day House Detroit Catholic Worker is a house of hospitality founded in 1978 by Fr. Tom Lumpkin and four Catholic laypeople to provide the works of mercy to the Corktown community in southwest Detroit. To this day, it is a space that provides warm meals and coffee, laundry, and showers, and short to mid-term emergency housing for the unhoused. In the tradition of the Catholic Worker movement started by Dorothy Day in the 1930s, the house is an intentional, liturgical community living by the precepts of the gospel. It is currently maintained by five young volunteers living in intentional poverty who also serve daily at the connected Manna Community Meal soup kitchen and Corner Shower & Laundry charity.

Day House is currently in a state of transition. After several years of serving as a coed community center, the house is shifting its priorities to serving single parents and children who are fleeing domestic violence and unstable living conditions. All those who seek, ask, and knock will still be served at the door, but the house is hopeful that its new focus on families will serve those who are truly on the margins of the most marginalized communities.

In order to ensure this transition is possible by spring of 2023, there are several renovation projects that must be completed to create a safe house environment. The primary focus of these renovations will be the kitchen, which requires working on electric, gas, plumbing, drywall, and flooring.
