# Philip's Fast (Filipovka)

Nov. 15th – Dec. 24th

a translation of the fasting rules provided in Chapter 33 of the Typicon:

"It is fitting to know that, during the fast of the Holy Apostles, and of the Nativity of Christ, on Tuesday and Thursday, we do not eat fish, but oil and wine only. On Monday, on Wednesday and Friday, we taste neither oil nor wine, but we fast until the ninth hour [3pm], and on these days we eat dry food. On Saturdays and Sundays, we eat fish. If a saint having the [Great] Doxology occurs on a Tuesday or on a Thursday, we eat fish. If on a Monday, likewise. If on a Wednesday or a Friday, we permit oil and wine only. We eat once a day. If a saint having a vigil [occurs] on a Wednesday or a Friday, we permit oil and wine and fish. If the memorial of the saint whose temple it is occurs on a Wednesday or a Friday, we do likewise."

# Decorating for Christmas!

We have decorated with trees and red pointsettias for the Phillip's Fast. On Christmas Eve, we will add white pointsettias to the red and fill the trees with lights and decorations in celebration of Christmas!

Thank you to all who have donated an ornament! These ornaments donated by all the various members of the parish become a representation of our community rejoicing together in celebration of the birth of our Lord. It's not too late! You can even bring an ornament in on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day and hang it on the tree yourself. Because these ornaments will be in the church, they should be of a sacred character.



# 2022 Christmas Services

Christmas is on a Sunday this year,

which means the services are arranged differently than usual.

When December 24<sup>th</sup> falls on a Saturday or Sunday, the day of strict fasting and the celebration of the Royal Hours are moved to the preceding Friday, since Saturday and Sunday are never days of fasting in the Byzantine tradition. We do abstain from certain foods, such as meat, on Saturdays and Sundays during fasting seasons and on this Christmas Eve, but we eat other foods after Divine Liturgy in the mornings. (*To fast is to spend some amount of time eating nothing. On strict fast days, such as Friday, December 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Byzantine tradition is to fast (eat nothing) until Vespers (sunset) or until Ninth Hour (3pm). This is not a law in our particular Church but may be followed voluntarily).* 


Divine Liturgy is celebrated every Saturday morning (except Holy Saturday). This is true even if Christmas Eve (December 24th) falls on a Saturday. On Saturday morning at 10am, therefore, as we usually do, we will celebrate the Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom.


Since Divine Liturgy is celebrated on the morning of December 24, it is not celebrated again in the evening. (*It is a general rule in our tradition that the Divine Liturgy is only celebrated once per day in each church*). Therefore, Vespers for Christmas will be celebrated by itself, still with the Gospel of the Nativity, but without the Divine Liturgy, at 4pm on Saturday, December 24<sup>th</sup>. Our parish Holy Supper will follow this at 6pm and Great Compline for Christmas will begin at 9pm. This will not be joined to Matins as it usually is on Christmas Eve because we will celebrate Matins on Sunday morning, as we usually do, at 8:15am. The Divine Liturgy of St. Basil for Christmas will be celebrated Sunday morning at 10:00am, since it was not celebrated the night before.

All of this is as described in the Typikon (2022 Typicon, pp. 92 - 93).

# A Holy Supper

In the Slavic tradition, a special meal called the Holy Supper is shared on Christmas Eve. This is meatless but nonetheless sumptuous. There are usually twelve symbolic courses. You're invited to join us at St. Stephen for this holy supper. If you would like to come, please sign up in the narthex along with which course you will bring to share.





## Come, Follow Me

A program of parish renewal and scripture study for discipleship with weekly exercises and homework.

## Reflections on the Divine Liturgy

We will gather most Sundays in the coming few months after the Divine Liturgy to reflect upon the Divine Liturgy together. Our next class is **Sunday**, **December 18**<sup>th</sup> Fr. John will present information about the Divine Liturgy and there will also be the opportunity for each of us to share our own thoughts and experiences of Divine Liturgy.

## The Holy Land & Biblical Archaeology

As we enter into the Sundays of preparation for the Great Fast, Daniel Lauffer will offer us a presentation on his experiences in the Holy Land and of Biblical Archaeology. These reflections will help strengthen our awareness of the real humanity of our Lord Jesus Christ, who really lived and died and rose again in a real time and place of history. This is especially good to reflect on as we prepare for the Great and Holy Week which will lead into our celebration of Pascha.

## **Bible Study**

As we enter the Great Fast itself, Kevin Perrotta will again lead us in study and discussion of Holy Scripture. Please continue to share with us what particular books or themes you'd most appreciate.

## **Daily Prayer in the Byzantine Tradition**

Also as we are increasing our life of prayer during the Great Fast, Fr. John will teach and lead discussion on the Byzantine tradition of daily prayer, both in terms of daily liturgical prayer and also in terms of developing our own rules of prayer for private prayer in our homes. This course will be offered on a weeknight during the Great Fast.

#### St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St Nicholas Apostolate had several successful meetings, and we welcome all parishioners interested to attend future meetings! A monthly meeting will be held every third Tuesday at 7:30 pm via Zoom. Email Fr Deacon Lawrence at <a href="mailto:frdeaconlawrence@yahoo.com">frdeaconlawrence@yahoo.com</a>.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- 1) charitable organizations (such as Day House, Image of God Pregnancy Center, & Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "help those that ask" is through monetary donations. Someday soon, a basket next to an icon of St. Nicholas will be placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as seen fit. All donations are tax deductible. In the near future, volunteer opportunities will also be organized for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).

#### **Synodal Process**

From the survey and the conversations with parishioners in the context of reflections on the Beatitudes, we have formulated some goals for St. Stephen's.

### \* Develop opportunities for adult religious education

In the survey, parishioners expressed some reservations about their readiness to share the Christian faith with others. It seems that further education would be helpful. In order to develop something that will best meet parishioners needs, we need to ask more specific questions to discover areas in which they would most like to learn and formats they would find most helpful.

Action: we will create some ways of inquiring into educational needs in the parish during the fall. In the new year we will begin to present new educational opportunities.

Our goal is to involve at least 20 percent of the active adults in the parish in new educational experiences by Pascha next year.

### \* Encourage and help parishioners to go on retreats

Most parishioners report that they do not often or ever go on retreats. Taking retreat time is a normal practice in Christian life. While retreats in the eparchy are routinely brought to parishioners' attention, more could be done to encourage and help them.

Action: we will give more attention to helping parishioners see the value of taking retreats and will work to identify and promote retreats and help people attend them (transportation, etc.).

We would like to see 10 percent of the active adults in the parish attend a retreat by the end of 2023.

## \* Develop outreach opportunities

In conversation over the Beatitudes, parishioners expressed the need for ways of serving neighbors in need and also for deepening community life within the parish. Developing outreach opportunities in a way that also deepens parishioners relationships with each other would help to meet this need.

Action: We will revive the long defunct St. Nicholas Apostolate as a way of involving parishioners in service to needy neighbors—and to each other in the parish. The apostolate will encourage donations for help to individuals outside and inside the church and will help parishioners learn about, support, and participate in selected local nonprofit organizations.

Our goal is to involve at least 20 percent of the active adults in the parish in this apostolate.

## Stewardship

The Feast of the Nativity of our Lord is this week and through the liturgies of the Church we have been called to focus on the miracle of the *Incarnation* in the cave of Bethlehem. God the Father will give us the greatest gift in His Son this Christmas. How are you responding to God's gracious gift to us? How will you show your gratitude for the infant Christ?

As you complete your preparations for the Christmas Feast, please remember the Eparchy of Parma and the Church's needs by contributing to the annual Stewardship Appeal. Visit <u>parma.org</u> to make your one-time or monthly donation through our secure website. Thank you for your generosity!

St. Stephen's goal this year is \$6,900. So far, 17 donors from St. Stephen have donated \$2520, putting us at roughly 37% of our goal. Thank you! If our parish exceeds its goal, a rebate will be paid equal to 100% of the amount by which we exceed our goal. Rebates paid will be exempt from the 10% eparchial assessment. This rebate plan will help to strengthen the parishes and provide an opportunity to raise additional funds that are not subject to assessment.

### Reap the Most Tax Benefit While Supporting Your Parish

Maximize your giving dollars before the ball drops on New Year's Eve by using funds in your retirement account to support your parish. The IRA Charitable Rollover/Qualified Charitable Distribution allows donors who are 70.5 years or older to transfer up to \$100,000 from a traditional or Roth IRA to a qualified charity like St. Stephen. In doing so, donors keep their IRA distribution from impacting their gross income and possibly avoid being bumped into a higher tax bracket. The IRA charitable rollover can also count toward your required minimum distribution (RMD), which starts at age 72.

All transfers must be made directly from an IRA custodian to St. Stephen by December 31<sup>st</sup> to qualify as a 2022 rollover and be excluded from the donor's taxable income.
