An Altar Curtain for St. Stephen

As you may or may not remember, Fr. Michael & Janine Kunitz gave our parish an altar curtain as a wedding gift three years ago. Getting this installed has proven an unforeseen saga, the details of which I won't go into, but it finally happened this week!

Here below is an article on the altar curtain that Fr. Michael (then Subdeacon) wrote for us at the time of giving us this gift:

What is this?

The Altar Curtain (or Altar Veil) is a linen which is drawn behind the Holy Doors of the Iconostasis (Icon Screen) and aids in the ritual separation of the Sanctuary (Holy Place) from the Nave. It is reminiscent of the veils which separated the Sanctuary and Holy of Holies in the Old Testament Jewish Temples. Even in the Gospel accounts, we hear about the tearing of these veils upon the death of Christ on the Cross. The inclusion of such curtains in Christian worship is common to a variety of traditions, including the Byzantine tradition.

Where did it come from?

Early Christians understood themselves as the inheritors of the religious tradition passed onto them by their Jewish forebears. Christ was Jewish and all his Apostles were Jewish, with Gentile followers quickly coming into the fold after the Resurrection. As such, while Christianity would go on to grow into its own unique expression of the faith as handed down by the descendants of Adam and Abraham. Therefore, in Christianity, especially in Catholicism and Orthodoxy, much of our religious practices and nomenclature look very Jewish. One of the reasons we maintain the use of Old Testament scripture is because we recognize a spiritual continuity with that tradition. When Christianity began to move out of home Churches and into larger temples for public worship, developments which harked back to the old Tent of Meeting (Exodus 36:8- 38:20) and the Temple of Solomon (1 Kings 6:1-38 and 7:13-51) were not far behind. One of the earliest versions of this was the Templon, a barrier which separated the clergy in the sanctuary from the laity in the nave. This would develop into the Iconostasis with Curtain which we are familiar with today.

• What does it mean?

Apart from having a cosmetic similarity to the old Jewish Temple, the Altar Curtain is another example of how the Byzantine tradition emphasizes the aspects of mystery and covering of sacred things in our spirituality. While God has made Himself manifested to us in the Incarnation, there is still much about Him which is beyond our comprehension and even set apart from our own perceptions, just like in the Old Testament context. Bearing in mind also that we are not merely the people of the Old Covenant but also of the new, the opening of

the Curtain is a unique feature to Christianity. Where before the Curtain was always closed to the people, now the Curtain is torn open by the Passion of Christ (Matthew 27: 45-56, Mark 15:33-41, and Luke 23:44-49). The Curtain emphasizes the mysteries of God in its concealing of the Sanctuary and accentuates God revealing Himself to us every time it is drawn open, especially during Pascha where the Curtain is fully opened for all of Bright Week.

• Why have we never seen it before?

While the inclusion of an Altar Curtain is not universally done on a pastoral basis, varying from parish to parish, it is nonetheless a part of the received liturgical traditions of our Byzantine Catholic Church. In 1944, a commission from the Sacred Congregation of the Eastern Churches in Rome published and promulgated, among many others, two books which discussed the practice and implementation of liturgy and worship in our Church:

The Ordo Celebrationis: The Order for the Celebrations of Vespers, Orthros and the Divine Liturgy According to the Ruthenian Recension

and the

Instruction for Applying the Liturgical Prescriptions of the Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches.

The purpose of these books was to outline the attributes of our Ruthenian expression of our Byzantine Catholic faith. Among these texts are frequently mentioned of the use of the Altar Curtain as a preferred included element in our worship spaces. In the United States, many of our people rejected their inclusion (even rejecting the inclusion of the Icon Screen as a whole) for a variety of reasons. Despite these objections, nothing has changed in the formal position of our particular church, which is to have a preference for involving all aspects of our liturgical life, including the Altar Curtain.


Summer Bible Discussion – 1 Corinthians





St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St Nicholas Apostolate had several successful meetings, and we welcome all parishioners interested to attend future meetings! A monthly meeting will be held every third Tuesday at 7:30 pm via Zoom. Email Fr Deacon Lawrence at frdeaconlawrence@yahoo.com.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- 1) charitable organizations (such as Day House, Image of God Pregnancy Center, & Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "help those that ask" is through monetary donations. Someday soon, a basket next to an icon of St. Nicholas will be placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as seen fit. All donations are tax deductible. In the near future, volunteer opportunities will also be organized for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).

Synodal Process

From the survey and the conversations with parishioners in the context of reflections on the Beatitudes, we have formulated some goals for St. Stephen's.

* Develop opportunities for adult religious education

In the survey, parishioners expressed some reservations about their readiness to share the Christian faith with others. It seems that further education would be helpful. In order to develop something that will best meet parishioners needs, we need to ask more specific questions to discover areas in which they would most like to learn and formats they would find most helpful.

Action: we will create some ways of inquiring into educational needs in the parish during the fall. In the new year we will begin to present new educational opportunities.

Our goal is to involve at least 20 percent of the active adults in the parish in new educational experiences by Pascha next year.

* Encourage and help parishioners to go on retreats

Most parishioners report that they do not often or ever go on retreats. Taking retreat time is a normal practice in Christian life. While retreats in the eparchy are routinely brought to parishioners' attention, more could be done to encourage and help them.

Action: we will give more attention to helping parishioners see the value of taking retreats and will work to identify and promote retreats and help people attend them (transportation, etc.).

We would like to see 10 percent of the active adults in the parish attend a retreat by the end of 2023.

* Develop outreach opportunities

In conversation over the Beatitudes, parishioners expressed the need for ways of serving neighbors in need and also for deepening community life within the parish. Developing outreach opportunities in a way that also deepens parishioners relationships with each other would help to meet this need.

Action: We will revive the long defunct St. Nicholas Apostolate as a way of involving parishioners in service to needy neighbors—and to each other in the parish. The apostolate will encourage donations for help to individuals outside and inside the church and will help parishioners learn about, support, and participate in selected local nonprofit organizations.

Our goal is to involve at least 20 percent of the active adults in the parish in this apostolate.
