THE **ΤΗΕ ΝΑΤΙVITY FAST**

From November 15 to December 24, we hold the Nativity Fast (Slavonic: Filipovka) which is a 40-day period of fasting and penance as preparation for the Nativity of Jesus Christ. By fasting, we are opening up a "space" in our lives through asceticism and obedience, into which God may enter.

Filipovka

THE FAST BEFORE CHRISTMAS

The Church wishing to commemorate the fact that the pious patriarchs and the just men of the Old Testament awaited the arrival of the Messias by fasting and prayer, prescribes a fast for her faithful. We are expected to prepare ourselves for the celebration of Christmas by prayer and fasting.

Concerning the origin of this fast, the opinions vary and are even contradictory. According to W. Durandus, one of the most important medieval liturgical writers, (+1296), the fast was introduced by St. Peter the Apostle. (Rationale Div. Officiorum VI. C. 2). This, however, is highly improbable, since the feast of Christmas is of later origin. The first sound documents about the fast are recorded in the Acts of the Synod of Macon in 582. After this synod, the fast was introduced in the dioceses of France. In the same century it was accepted in Rome from which it spread throughout the entire Western Church. From the west, the fast was adopted in the Eastern Church but not before the 9th century. St. Theodore the Studite (+826) wrote extensively about the fasts in the Eastern Church, but he does not record the fast before Christmas at all. Baludianski, a well-known historian of Ruthenia, in his Church History (p. 284) makes mention that this fast was introduced in the 10th century by monks. At that time, almost every bishop was chosen from among the monks; therefore, the bishop made the fast obligatory for all faithful. The introduction of the fast in the 10th century is very probable. In the liturgical books of the Byzantine-Slavonic rite, which were mostly compiled in the 9th and the beginning of the 10th century, there is no mention made of this fast.

The fast before Christmas begins on the feast of St. Philip the Apostle, which falls on November 14th and for this reason it is popularly known as the Philippian fast. Sometimes it is also popularly called "forty days' fast" because it actually lasts for forty days (November 15 - December 24).

These yearly fasts are so distributed throughout the course of the year, that the law of abstinence is recalled to us in every season. Accordingly, we celebrate the fast of the season of spring during Lent, that of summer through St. Peter's fast, that of harvesting time through the fast before the Assumption, and that of winter through the fast before Christmas.

Special Collections 2024

December 7-8, 2024 – Retirement Fund for Religious

The Sisters of St. Basil the Great in Uniontown benefit directly from this USCCB Collection for their retired nuns. As they were active and provided ministry to our Eparchy in the past, we wish to help them by participating in this collection. This collection is not for our retired priests but will only benefit the retired nuns of the community of St. Basil the Great.

St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- 1) charitable organizations
 - (such as the Image of God Pregnancy Center and Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "give to the one who asks" (Matt 5:42) is through monetary donations. A donation box next to an icon of St. Nicholas has been placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as he deems appropriate. All donations are tax deductible. We also hope to organize volunteer opportunities for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity, you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).
