




Bible Discussion Group

The Reason for the Season

Emmanuel, God with us, is the so-called "reason" for the "season." I often chuckle when I see signs and bumper stickers exclaiming that yes, indeed, "Jesus is the reason for the season!" While I understand the sentiment behind the quaint phrase, I have to say that it bothers me a bit. What bothers me about it is not what it says, but rather, what it doesn't say.

While yes, it is a seemingly polite way to remind the more mainstream/commercial world of why Christmas is celebrated, this phrase may also create some confusion. During exactly what season is Jesus the reason? Is it the commercial Christmas shopping season from the day after Thanksgiving until December 24? Or is it from Filipovka until December 25? Or until Theophany? Does Jesus' reason for the season coincide with the Roman Catholic season of Advent? I think you get the idea.

Saying that Jesus is the "reason for the season" all but undercuts the entire liturgical life of the Church and presupposes that the "commercial calendar" is the standard timeframe of the "Christmas Season" and Jesus is supposed "fit into" that timeframe, ultimately giving the impression that, to the chagrin of Charlie Brown, commercialism won out in the great debate of "what Christmas is all about." What came from the good intention of defending the faith ends up having the exact opposite effect. Furthermore, it almost seems like Jesus has been reduced to a seasonal item; just another decoration to be taken out of the attic, dusted off, and put on display only to be put away in a few short weeks until next year.

If we truly want to defend the faith, I firmly believe that we don't need catchy phrases, or slogans, or any such thing. We need to look no further than the Church herself. If we want to defend the faith, pray. Follow the liturgical seasons. Fast when the Church asks us to Fast, Feast when she asks us to Feast. We need not exclaim Jesus to be the "reason for the season," but rather the very reason for living every single day! Even further, we need not even exclaim it—we need to LIVE it! Let our actions speak for themselves.

Commercialism is indeed a problem, one that will not go away. We do not need to purchase signs to combat it. There is only one sign we need, and that is the Sign of Emmanuel, God with us! As we, a people of faith, prepare for Christmas—the Feast of the Nativity, the Winter Pascha—let us call to mind the words of the Prophet Isaiah:

There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD. And his delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. (Isaiah 11:1-3)

Let us search for wisdom and understanding, counsel and might, not in a sign, but in THE Sign. Let us never forget that this Sign is not an end — no, far from it. The Incarnation is, as is Christmas Day, not the end of a season. No. It is the beginning. The beginning of the fulfillment of the promise of eternal life in and with our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ!

St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- 1) charitable organizations (such as the Image of God Pregnancy Center and Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "give to the one who asks" (Matt 5:42) is through monetary donations. A donation box next to an icon of St. Nicholas has been placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as he deems appropriate. All donations are tax deductible. We also hope to organize volunteer opportunities for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity, you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).

Assembly 2025 - Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh

Metropolitan Archbishop William C. Skurla and the Council of Hierarchs invite presentation proposals for the 3rd Assembly of the Byzantine Catholic Metropolitan Church of Pittsburgh, scheduled for July 16-20, 2025, at St. Mary's Byzantine Catholic Church in Whiting, Indiana. This assembly, continuing the synodal process begun in 2022, aims to deepen the appreciation of Byzantine Ruthenian worship and spirituality in North America. The event will feature two tracks: a clergy track from July 16-18 and a laity track from July 18-20, under the theme "Come let us worship and bow before Christ."

The assembly committee seeks proposals from clergy, religious, and lay individuals or teams, focusing on two main areas: the current state of worship and spirituality in the Church, and future directions for growth and evangelization. Presentations should combine personal experience and academic research.

Interested individuals are asked to submit a short paragraph outlining their topic, a five-minute video presentation, and a brief bio to Fr. Cyril Farmer at byzantineassembly@gmail.com by January 15, 2025. Selected presenters will be notified by April 1, 2025.
