Theophany House Blessings

House Blessings began on Theophany (January 6th) and would ideally finish before it's leave-taking on January 14th. Please let Fr. John know what date(s) would be best for him to come to your home for this annual blessing. He can come after January 14th if there are no times prior to that that work for you, but he asks that the blessings conclude before the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, which this year is February 9th.

There are envelopes for this purpose in your boxes for 2025.

I am looking forward to blessing your homes with the Jordan Water! This is an annual blessing and an important part of our celebration of Theophany. Just as you wouldn't skip Easter Baskets for Pascha, turkey for Thanksgiving, or gift-giving for Christmas, don't skip the house blessing for Theophany!

For the Blessing of Homes, there is no suggested amount for a freewill offering to the priest, but we may offer whatever amount we wish.

CHRIST IS BAPTIZED!

It has become a widespread practice to give the greeting "Christ is baptized" during the Theophany Feast from January 6-14.

It certainly was a mark of the Christian piety of the Carpatho-Rusyn people to share their faith in their daily lives. The common greeting they gave to one another was "Glory to Jesus Christ," to which the one who was being greeted would respond, "Now and forever." For two high feasts there were special greeting, for Pascha, "Christ is risen! With the response "Indeed, he is risen!" For Christmas, from December 25-31, the greeting was "Christ is born! Glorify him!" These were actually the first two words from the Matins Canon on Christmas, well-known to the faithful. These words, in turn were taken from Homily 38 by St. Gregory the Theologian. In recent times, there has been a reasoning that the Feast of Theophany, the Baptism of Christ, was a feast equal in dignity to Christmas, but there was no special greeting. Perhaps a greeting could be created. I guess that this happened in the 1980's. I don't remember this being used earlier, though I would welcome any information on earlier use. Around that time, I saw it written down for the first time, and a greeting was created that corresponded to Christmas: "Christ is baptized! Glorify him!"

Not too long afterward, another version was heard, "Christ is baptized! To which one responded, "In the Jordan!" This made the Theophany greeting different from Christmas. It had no liturgical or patristic sources. When I was pastor of Dormition Church in Akron, in the 1980's, I remember a woman explaining to me the "correct" Christmas greeting. She said, "It should be, "Christ is born!" with the response, "In Bethlehem of Judea." I was fascinated by her explanation and did a little research about this, and found it was actually a common Polish Catholic custom. This may explain the Theophany change, someone who knew the Polish Christmas tradition, simply applied it to Theophany, and proposed the response, "In the Jordan!" Of course, this may simply be a quibble about piety, and certainly not a dogmatic question. Perhaps the original response, "Glorify him," is better, since the greeter would proclaim a reality of faith, and the responder would answer with what we should do about that reality. This, of course, also applies to the other greetings, "Christ is risen!" – this is the reality of our faith and should be the spirit of our life. "Christ is among us!" "He is and will be." We should see Christ in each of our neighbors, he is among us. "Christ is born!" "Christ is baptized!" these are wondrous deeds God has done for us, and we should respond by giving him glory and thanksgiving and living according to his teachings.

Another issue with the greetings was a problem that many people saw about the greeting "Glory to Jesus Christ!" I have met people who complained about it, saying that we cannot give glory to God, all glory is already God's, and we humble human beings cannot add to that glory. They proposed the alternate "Praised be Jesus Christ!" Of course, the tradition is "Glory," in Slavonic "Slava." The answer is, of course, that we, as limited and unworthy human beings, cannot add to God's glory, but that is not the issue, we are simply proclaiming that truly all glory belongs to God, and that we are simply acknowledging that glory, not adding to it. We can only "glorify God" by being the kind of person God, in his glory, has created us to be. It is as St. Irenaeus, as early as the second century, wrote: "For the glory of God is the living man, and the life of man is the vision of God." (*Against heresies*, IV, 20, 7).

St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- 1) charitable organizations (such as the Image of God Pregnancy Center and Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "give to the one who asks" (Matt 5:42) is through monetary donations. A donation box next to an icon of St. Nicholas has been placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as he deems appropriate. All donations are tax deductible. We also hope to organize volunteer opportunities for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

Metropolitan Archbishop William C. Presentations should combine personal experience and academic research. Interested individuals are asked to submit a short paragraph outlining their topic, a five-minute video presentation, and a brief bio to Fr. Cyril Farmer at by January 15, 2025. Selected presenters will be notified by April 1, 2025. Presenters will receive a stipend of \$250.00 and their Assembly registration will be covered.
