

St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

1) charitable organizations

(such as the Image of God Pregnancy Center and Fish & Loaves)

2) fellow parishioners in need

3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "give to the one who asks" (Matt 5:42) is through monetary donations. A donation box next to an icon of St. Nicholas has been placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by Fr. John Russell as he deems appropriate. All donations are tax deductible. We also hope to organize volunteer opportunities for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club, but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity, you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).

Charitable Giving from St. Stephen Parish

Through our St. Nicholas Apostolate, we donate \$50 per month to Fish & Loaves Community Food Pantry and to the Image of God Pregnancy Center (4151 Seminole St., Detroit)

for the Church in Central & Eastern Europe, we have collected \$225. for Catholic Charities of Southeast Michigan, we have collected \$138. for Catholic Home Missions, we have collected \$100. for Peter's Pence, we have collected \$10

Building Fund

We are establishing a separate account with the Parishes Together Fund which will hold all donations to the Building Fund received beginning in 2025. Additionally, we will be depositing 10% of our monthly rental income from the school into this account. Additionally, we are closing one of our savings accounts, which has a very poor interest rate (0.11%), and depositing most of its funds into this new Building Fund, which has a better interest rate (2.75%). These funds (\$30,000), which were previously for undesignated use, will be designated for the needs of the building.

In 2024, \$5,963.60 was donated to the Building Fund. Thank you! Meanwhile, in 2024, we spent \$53,398.27 on needed building repairs, using all the donated funds and considerably more.

So far in 2025, \$2,200 have been donated to the Building Fund. Thank you! We are facing many more expensive building projects this year, including most urgently the reopening of fire exits – one in the rectory and one on the southeast of the church building.

Our opening deposit for the Building Fund is: \$32,710

- One time deposit from the closed savings account: \$30,000
- January 2025 donations to the Building Fund: \$2,200
- 10% of our Jan. 2025 rental income from the school: \$510
