LITANY OF PEACE PRAYER GROUP ON ZOOM

BEGINNING 9-10 P.M., TUESDAY, MAY 6th

From its beginning, the Church of Jesus Christ has been under attack by Satan, his demons, and even by governments. Trying to ignore that reality has only distracted Christianity from its primary evangelical calling. We are all to pray for and witness God's extraordinary grace so that we and others may find peace. We do that at every liturgy but are taught to pray without ceasing. This Church has taught me much about this, but now it is time to move beyond the walls of our church building. The opportunity begins with prayer.

Pentecost is the story of God's movement upon the world through prayer. It was prompted by the Holy Spirit (See Romans 8:26), and through obedience, the 120 prayed in the upper room in Jerusalem. The Holy Spirit came with the sound of "a mighty rushing wind" and with "tongues of fire" and miraculous speech (See Acts of the Apostles chapters 2-4). Pascha is fulfilled with the birth of the Church at Pentecost.

On May 6th at 9 p.m., after the children and grandchildren are in bed, we will launch our Litany of Peace Prayer group on Zoom.

First, you will need a pomyannyk, which the parish will provide. This is a booklet for keeping the names of those for whom you are praying.

Second, you will need a copy of *The Pillars of St. Stephen*, a prayerbook to the saints recently published in commemoration of 70 years of our parish serving Allen Park.

These will be available in the Narthex on Saturdays and Sundays at 10 a.m.

Please consider an offering to defray expenses.

Third, you will need a copy of the book by Carson D Lauffer, *The Healing of a Soul*. Please consider an offering for these, or you may purchase a copy for \$12.99 from Amazon.

St. Nicholas Apostolate

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is a means for members in our parish to practice Christian love through giving charitable donations and volunteering. The St. Nicholas Apostolate is facilitating donations from the parish for three funds modeled after the three purses of St. Nicholas. He was a wealthy man before he became a priest and bishop, and he chose to use his wealth to save three impoverished women from slavery by giving each of them a sack of gold coins for a dowry. St. Nicholas is often shown holding three purses or three coins. The three purses of the St. Nicholas Apostolate will be used to support the following:

- charitable organizations
 (such as the Image of God Pregnancy Center and Fish & Loaves)
- 2) fellow parishioners in need
- 3) neighbors and strangers who come to the parish seeking help.

One way that parishioners are encouraged to practice Christ's command to "give to the one who asks" (Matt 5:42) is through monetary donations. A donation box next to an icon of St. Nicholas has been placed in the narthex with envelopes for parishioners to donate to a purse of their choosing or simply to make an unrestricted gift. Donations for the first purse, charitable organizations, are given directly to the organizations. Donations for the second and third purses, our parishioners and our neighbors, are distributed by the parish priest as he deems appropriate. All donations are tax deductible. We also hope to organize volunteer opportunities for the parish to participate in.

The St. Nicholas Apostolate is not a philanthropic club but rather is a vehicle for the parish community to respond to God's commandment to love our neighbor, especially our neighbors in need.

"On the subject of mutual charity, you have no need for anyone to write you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another.... Nevertheless, we urge you... to progress even more." (1 Thessalonians 4:9-10).
